The object of Crimes Against Property, e.g., robbery, bribery, and burglary, is to obtain money, property, or some other benefit.

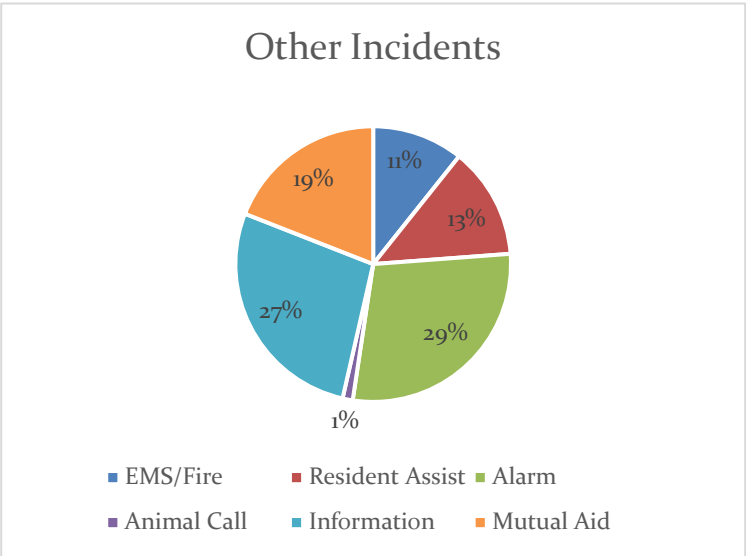
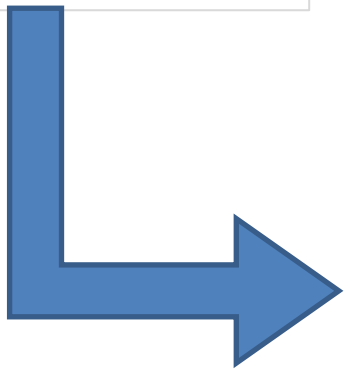
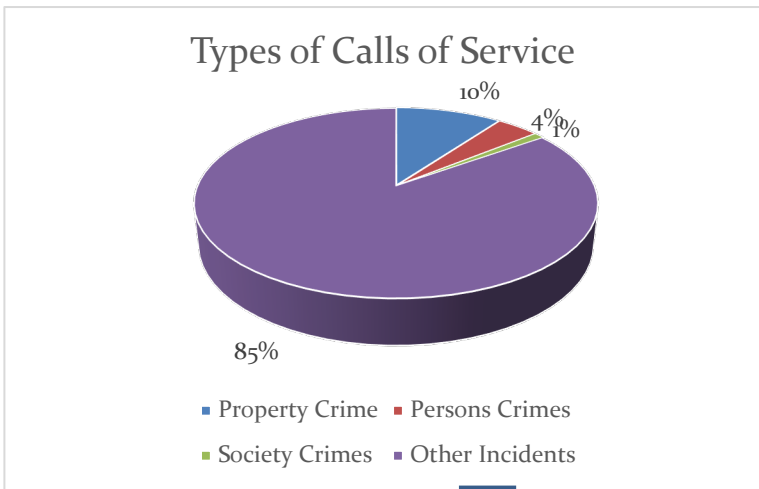

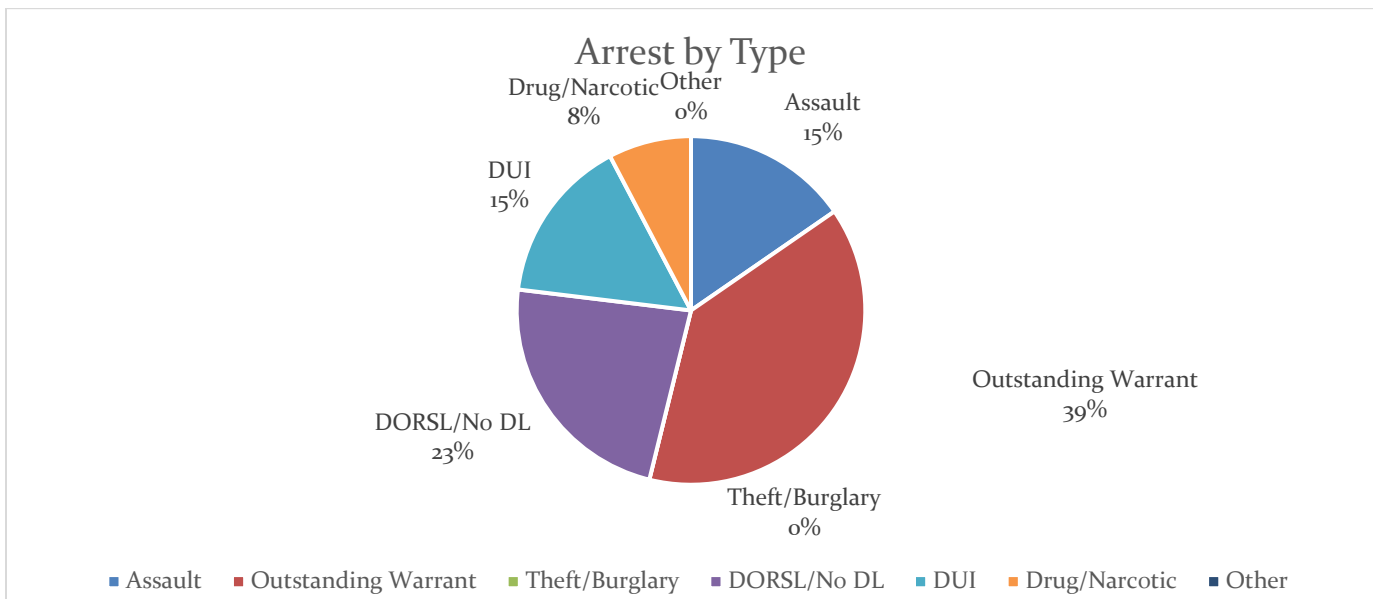

The arrest data represents physical arrests and citations issued in lieu of an arrest.

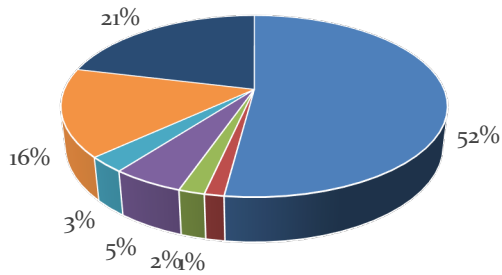

Department Highlights

- On April 14, 2023, the Fairfield Glade Police Department conducted a checkpoint for impaired drivers. These proactive measures are to reduce motor vehicle accidents, remove impaired drivers, and make the roadways safe for our communities. The success of this event could not have been possible without the partnership and dedication of officers and members of surrounding agencies.
 - The checkpoint was set up on Peavine Road near Westminster Drive from 8 pm – 10 pm. A total of 344 vehicles passed through the checkpoint. The checkpoint yielded 7 impaired driver evaluations, 9 citations for traffic violations, and one citation in lieu of an arrest for possession of a narcotic.

- Chief Self and Captain Sherrill conducted an impaired driver awareness demonstration using Fatal Vision goggles (drunk goggles) with Roane State Community College students.
- The Fairfield Glade Police Department hosted the THSO. Child Passenger Safety certification class and assisted in conducting a free car seat checkpoint.



- National DEA Drug Take Back event at Food City. Over 100 pounds of medication was surrendered for disposal.



Fairfield Glade Police Department joined with the Cumberland Prevention Coalition in participation of the national drug take back day Saturday in front of Food City. Citizens dropped off out-of-date or unused narcotics for proper disposal and Glade residents kept the above bulky bins. Drug lock boxes and other items were distributed here.

Drug Take Back promotes safety

The Cumberland Prevention Coalition and local law enforcement agencies took part in National Drug Take Back Day April 22. Individuals dropped off their unused and out-of-date prescription medications at the Fairfield Glade Police Department, Walnut and the Cumberland County Sheriff's Office.

The Cumberland Prevention Coalition also offered medication lock boxes and other prevention tools. Drug Take Back Day is held in April and October each year, with 684 tons collected nationally in 2022. These medications were safely disposed of so that they could not be misused or abused.

According to the National Center for Drug Abuse Statistics, prescription abuse includes taking medication prescribed for someone else, taking more than the prescribed dose, taking medication in a different way than prescribed and using medication for a non-medical purpose. Prescription drug abuse can also be accidental — a curious child who comes upon medications that are not secure or someone confusing their prescriptions and taking medications that are no longer needed.

Statistics found 18.8% of Americans ages 12 and older — 32 million people — have deliberately misused prescription at least once in their lifetime. For many teens, 62% of prescription drugs offer easy access, and 59% say they believe prescription drugs are safer than illegal drugs.

A 2020-21 Tennessee Together Survey of Cumberland County students found that 85% of students who used prescription drugs to get high over the preceding 30 days. They got the drugs in the following ways:

- 63.8% took from someone without asking
- 44.6% took from someone's house or workplace without asking
- 42.9% got from someone they know for free
- 42% bought from a friend, relative, or someone else they know
