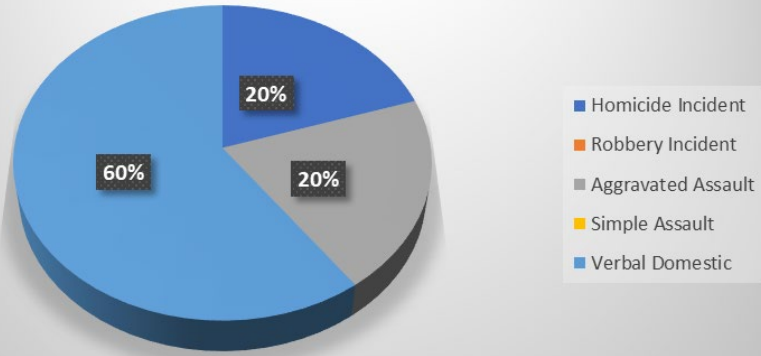

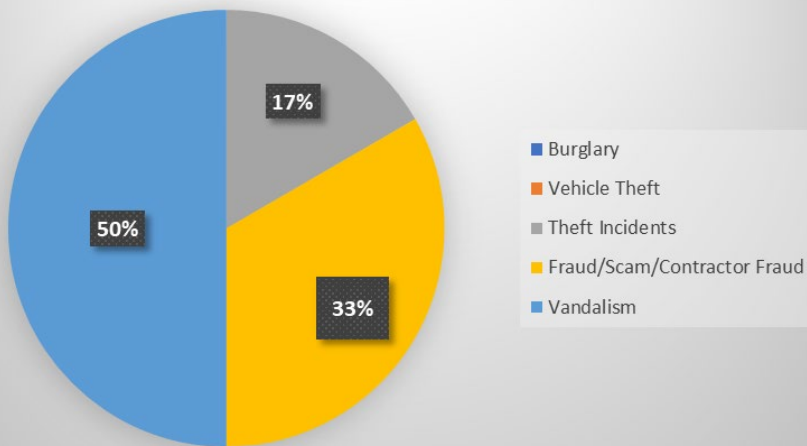

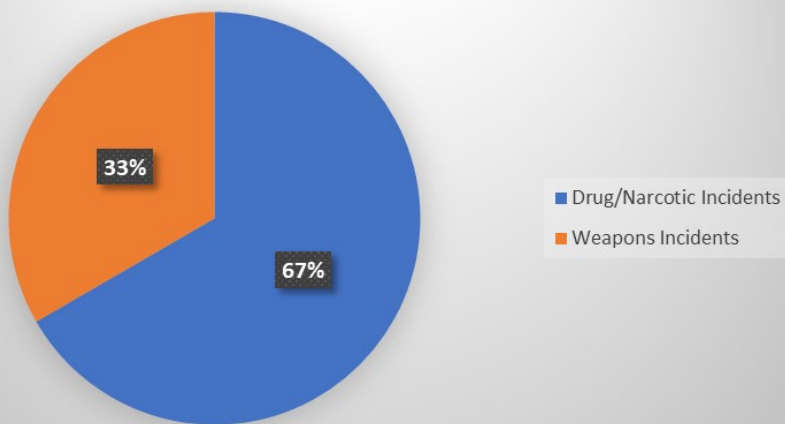
Person Crimes Month



Property Crimes Month

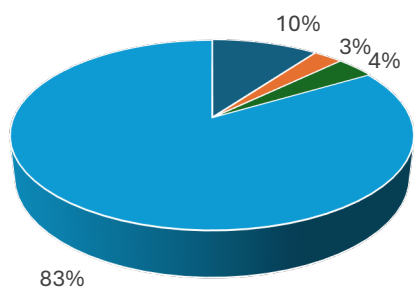


Society Crimes Month

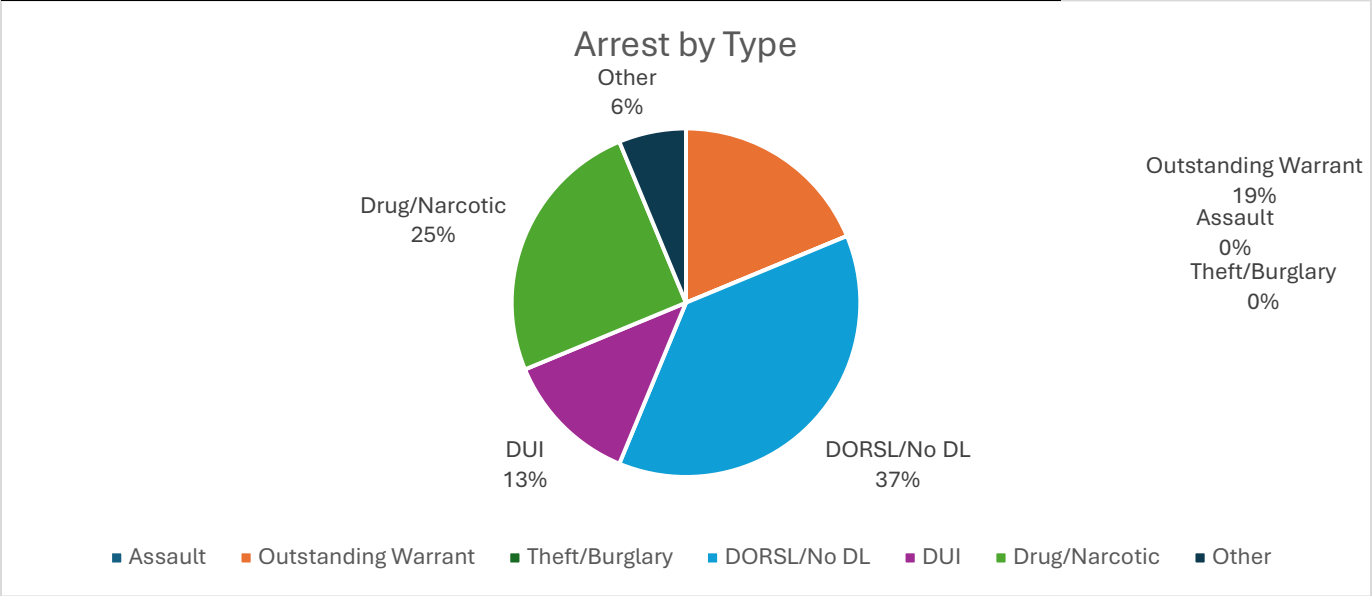

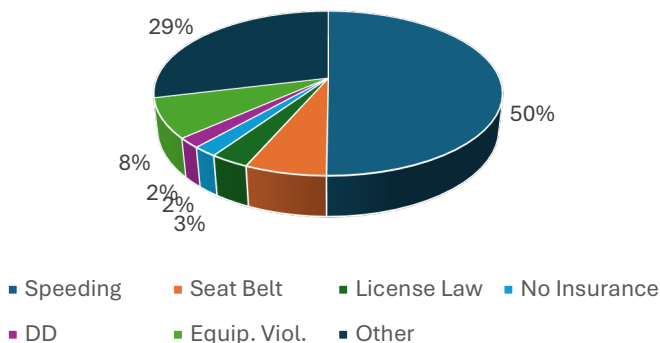
